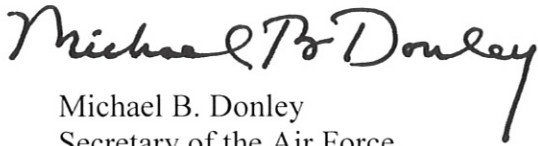
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To the Airmen of the United States Air Force:

October is Energy Action Month for our Nation. To emphasize each of our roles in energy savings, the Air Force has adopted "*I am Air Force Energy*" as our theme.
